That way by the time I wake up I have a lesson ready to watch and work ready to do. I've also really enjoyed having one different subject each day to work on. This helps me not only focus more on each assignment, but it has also helped me remember and learn so much!

Two of the main things that I have learnt while at OAC are the virtue of self discipline and the skill of communication.

It's not easy to have a routine of waking up to watch the lessons, then completing the assigned work and asking for help all from the comfort of your own home, but the teachers are so good and understanding and always offer to help with anything as they have our best interests at heart.

Jay said of his learning experience with OAC:

"I came to enrol at the OAC due to a clash with my other face-to-face lessons at school. I had been planning to Study Visual arts in Stage 1 for a few years - OAC enabled me to do so. I find that studying via WebEx can be challenging at times as it was something completely new to me and I didn't get that face-to-face communication with my teacher however this was made up for with easy communication and a supportive attitude.

"Working online has also enabled me to attend class at times where I usually would not have, such as when I am unwell. I think that meeting new people and learning from that will benefit my overall confidence and willingness to communicate."



Diana

I began studying with Open Access in Year 12, as I chose to push myself to do a subject I had a passion for that my high school did not offer. Initially, I found studying online quite difficult, as for 13 years, I had studied in a typical classroom environment.

As COVID-19 hit and started to disrupt the possible outcome of the year, having the skills to study independently and online came in handy. Looking in retrospect, studying with Open Access changed me as a student and as a future educator.

I learnt to trust myself when others doubt you, whether that's a teacher saying they don't think that your idea for an assignment could work or it's a future employer doubting if you would fit into a role.

I learnt that thinking out of the box can sometimes be beneficial, whether that is picking a less common topic for an assignment or doing an assignment in a unique form to your classmates.

For me, the assignments I was passionate about, due to picking elements that I connected with and stuck with my gut, were the assignments that I had the greatest success with.

Through my studies at Open Access, I was fortunate to be the Leila Rankine Award for Excellence recipient for the class of 2020 – for the highest achieving student for Stage 2 Aboriginal Studies.

For me, receiving this award meant that all the work that occurred during the year had paid dividends. I took a big step out of my comfort zone by persevering to do an external subject and the award was the icing on the cake of my personal development.

My passion for Aboriginal Studies has now carried over to my studies to become a teacher, with my main specialisation being History, subspecialising in Australian History.

Receiving the Leila Rankine award, as one of only two Indigenous students to be awarded it in the last few years, meant that I proved that all you need to succeed in a subject is a deep passion and a bit of grit and perseverance.



Jemimah

In 2021, year 10 student Jemimah won the annual Young Writer's Award in the Mental Health Foundation for Youth Creative Writing Competition – Senior Secondary Category for South Australia.

Jemimah won a prize and an invitation to the official launch of National Mental Health Month SA at Parliament House.

The award was for Jemimah's story *Paper Planes* and *Cuddles* - a version of which was published in the first issue of the Open Access College student-managed publication, the Access Gazette.

When asked about her experience learning with Open Access College, Jemimah told us this:

"I started OAC in Year 9, but only did 2 subjects: Music and Spanish. In 2021 I did OAC full time. I started OAC to do Year 10, 11 and 12 and gain my SACE credit.

"My experience studying online so far has been great, I love all my teachers. They are very supportive and helpful when I have questions or when I don't understand the homework. OAC has helped me gain friends for life, including My Best Friends Jacinta, Rahab, and Mikayla.

"I love to read and write. My English teacher Katie helped me enter in the Young Writers competition, where I had to write a short story about Mental Health. I really didn't think I would win, I'm a year 10 in the category with year 11s and 12s. Surprisingly I won.

"The inspiration for my story came from an idea I had one night and when I started putting the idea together the words started flowing out. My story was published in the first issue of the Gazette with a little tweak to the ending. It took me about a day to write out my story after I came up with the idea.

"I got to go to the Parliament House in the city to collect my award. I was extremely nervous and sure that I would muck up going to Parliament.

However afterwards I felt so excited. Having to go into Parliament to accept the award was a unique experience. It was very fun and afterwards Assistant Minister Jing Lee showed me around the library. I love libraries."

The artworks were on display at Kicco Café in the Marden Shopping Centre for all of August 2021.





Danica and Tamsyn address the college community as part of the 2021 Awards Ceremony, presented virtually on 2 December.

Tamsyn: I joined Open Access college at the beginning of year 10 in 2019. Before OAC I was homeschooled and was very nervous when it came to socialising with other people, I can very vividly remember my first lesson. I was rather timid and I remember my brother setting up my headset, giving me the good old double thumbs up and leaving me to it. Even though my hands refused to stop shaking, my teacher made me feel very welcome and all my teachers have continued to do so for all my years here. I personally found the environment both online and face to face to be a great confidence booster, and I'm very proud of how I've grown and how I've seen other people around me take steps towards their futures.

Danica: I began at OAC in mid 2019. I was struggling with my mental health and grades at my current school and Open Access was the perfect option

for me. When I began at Open Access, I no longer had to face bullying or an incompatible environment. Open Access is an incredible school that works so personally with all students to support their learning and their health. I can say truthfully that this school actually teaches alongside their motto "Every Learner, Every Way." I don't know where I would be without this school, my mental health is now much more positive and my grades moved from almost failing to almost straight As. The teachers at Open Access are so special, my favourite aspect of this school is that every teacher is always ready and happy to take the time out of their day to make sure you are okay. I think almost every teacher I have had at Open Access has spent extra, one on one time outside of class with me talking me through my upcoming assignments and nerves whenever I needed it. This amazed me because I was so used to teachers from face to face schools not understanding or knowing how to support students with unique needs, whereas Open Access teachers do this without having to try.

Tamsyn: Despite the pandemic, OAC has still been able to offer face to face opportunities for students to come together, meet and make connections with each other.

One of the events that we were lucky enough to enjoy this year was the school Formal. It was an enchanted forest theme and was loads of fun. One of the highlights was meeting other students face to face for the first time. By the end of the night we were singing, taking photos with each other and exchanging details as if we'd been friends for ages. I believe that as many students are primarily online, face to face events like the Formal and Come In Days are really nice because you get to meet new people and put faces to names that you already know from your lessons.

Danica: Everyone had a great time at the Formal but the pandemic did have an effect on the event and other aspects of the year. I know that a lot of students may have felt anxious because of what is going on in the world around us and worried about the effect this could have on our learning and future. I believe our community at Open Access has shown great resilience. This school works so hard to keep a positive outlook no matter what, as could be seen by the happy, covid-safe chair dancing at Formal. Students at Open Access were extremely lucky to already be confident online and continue with our learning uninterrupted through this pandemic. I think having a strong community with an unrelenting positive attitude really helped me and other students develop and maintain persistence during these difficult times.

Tamsyn: At the beginning of year 12 I found that many of my teachers recommended that I should begin a lot of my projects and assignments early. That way you can get it done in pieces rather than having to quickly start and finish assignments the week before. Trust me, as someone who did rush at least two of her assignments, I felt a lot more proud and confident in my work if I gave myself enough time to do it.

Danica: My advice to students going into year 12 at Open Access would be to make use of the amazing teachers. They are always so easy to contact and will find a way to solve your problems and help you out. Don't be afraid to talk to them, no question is a bad one at this school and I have never felt judged by any of my teachers. Also, make sure to speak up in class! You will get so much more out of your experience if you talk and it only takes one person speaking up to encourage the entire class to start sharing their ideas. This creates a much more fun learning environment for everyone.

Tamsyn: All of you should feel extremely proud of all your successes, no matter how small they seem to others, each step is an advancement to your future.


