

**Numeracy** – Using informal units to measure length, capacity, volume and mass.


**Literacy** – Procedural text structure. The magic 'e' on the end of words makes the vowel say their name. As well as including more information in morning talks and weekend recounts.

**Child Protection Curriculum (CPC)** - Personal space, safe and unsafe touch.












## MR CLAYTON'S YEARS 1 & 2





T his semester the year 2 students have been exploring how to measure the length, area, capacity and mass of different objects. The year 1 students have been exploring fractions and in particular, they've been exploring halves of whole objects and collections. Both the year levels have been looking at information reports this semester for their literacy.







In the beginning of term, Year 3 students revised their understanding of division strategies. I was pleased that many students retained a sound understanding of division.

Year 3 class is studying heat in Term 3. Students drew a mind map to show various ways to keep warm.


Year 4 class revisited the concept of 2D and 3D shapes. Students compared and contrasted the number of faces in a range of 3D shapes.

Year 4 students used their understanding of angles and shapes to illustrate characters in their stories. The task provided students the opportunity to integrate literacy and numeracy understanding.



If you can, you may recognise the first lines of two novels we are reading in English this term, *Holes* (by Louis Sachar) and *Storm Boy* (by Colin Thiele).

For the Year 5/6 class, Earth and Space Sciences is the Term 3 topic and the investigation of major geological events such as earthquakes, volcanic eruptions and tsunamis in Australia, Asia and the rest of the world is our focus for the first few weeks. Early glimpses of the students' developing projects concerning the world's most devastating earthquakes are intriguing.

At the end of Term 2, both classes had a quick look at how Islamic artisans produce their tessellations in art and architecture. The artwork of Isabel (above, left) and Todd (right) are examples of the type of tessellating patterns that we were able to generate using the same techniques.
