MESSAGE FROM THE HEAD OF CAMPUS

As we have done so countless times, SOTA community is determined to work through the challenges of CoVID. We missed out on a face-to-face Induction



in Week 1, but the desire to connect in person was not diminished. The community is gladly re-working our schedules to catch up in Week 5 in Port Augusta. Although the swiftness and agility might suggest that it's an easy logistical shift, it is not. When the motivation is strong, the logistical challenge is surmountable. SOTA community fully understands that connectedness to school and peers is a critical factor that contributes to student wellbeing and works hard to create opportunities to connect.

Whilst face-to-face events strengthen social connections, they are not the only means to do so. In addition to verbal feedback sessions which enhance learning and connection between teachers and students, we also introduced class assembly, more intentional breakout room opportunities and SOTA Social Space to enable more peer communication and strengthen the connection among students. Together with the symbolic singing of the school song, house teams, the insistence by parents that their children wear school uniforms and supervisors' effort in maintaining school routines, SOTA students are socialised to cultural elements of a 'conventional' school.

Providing students with an enabling academic foundation to engage with the concepts and content in high school is also critically important. SOTA teachers put thoughtful consideration to their planning and teaching of the Australian Curriculum to make the best of the limited contact time with students. Improving student reading is the site improvement goal for the next three years. OAC primary teachers had a full day of professional development on teaching comprehension by literacy educator, Sheena Cameron. It was a strategies-focused workshop which teachers found helpful.

We welcome Sara Ling to complete SOTA staff this year. Big thanks to Megan for her dedication to Years 2/3 and supporting Sara to take up her responsibilities.

Megan and MK teachers are absolutely delighted to be able to return to the road and visit families. This year, they will be travelling out on Monday, rather than Tuesday to spend more time with students. In support of their earlier departure from SOTA, they will need 2 hours on Tuesday, 2.30 - 4.30pm to join in school meetings.

Our collective effort prepares SOTA students in some way for educational, and cultural routines and expectations of high schools. Importantly, we do so in a way that is warm and supportive. Our new teachers told me recently that they are enjoying their work here. I'm too delighted to be working in a 'good little school'. Thank you, SOTA community. See you next week!





This term in Maths we started the year by exploring place value, number lines and rounding. We are currently practising our addition and subtraction strategies to effectively solve various problems.

In History, the year 5 students have been busy timelining the changes of the Australian colonies and exploring why they were expanding. The focus in Science has been exploring man-made and natural light sources, as well as experimenting with shadows.

This term in English, we have split our learning into three learning areas of Spelling, Reading and Writing. In Spelling our focus has been on the sounds that letters and their combinations make. While in Reading and Writing we are looking at persuasive texts and how authors/advertisement try and persuade us.
