

Library News





I'm super impressed with all the learning we've done; investigating plants in our







In Art, students sketched and painted a painterly portrait using a range of skills they have been learning with the marvellous Miss Mel.






Ms Mel – Term 2 Year 7



In Design and Technology Jacob and Abby used their knowledge of hydraulics to create a working model of a cattle crush and hydraulic gate that could be used on a station in the yards.



This term in HASS we have been learning about the Australia political and legal system. Ruby analysed the campaigns for and against the upcoming referendum and presented her understanding of how referendums in Australia are conducted.





In Science we have been learning about food webs and tropic levels. Stella recorded in detail a list of living organisms in the Flinders Ranges. She then created food chains and a food web to show the interactions and transfer of energy between these organisms.

On the day that the referendum is held, the eligible Australian citizens go to vote


either yes or no for the referendum. Once they have voted, their votes are then counted towards the referendum. If the referendum is approved by a majority of

It is important to understand the Australian political system because it allows you to understand the different levels of power in Parliament so you can make clear decisions about your public choices
