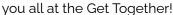
#### **DES**

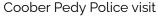

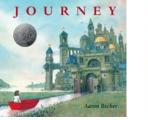


#### LIBRARY NEWS

page.



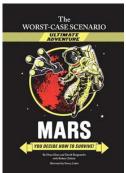




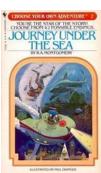

# **Miss Stringer - Reception**

#### Term 4 Overview

#### Literacy

Students will continue to use the Literacy Guarantee Unit and the daily recorded Heggerty Phonemic Awareness program to enhance their literacy and phonemic skills for reading, writing and oral language progression. The term will focus on building writing stamina to write weekly recounts, exploring the genre of letters while learning to stretch sentences adding more detail using who, what, where, when, why and how detail. Students will continue to read daily reading fluency passages (DORF) and weekly fluency lists as well as the program Reading Eggs for phoneme and grapheme consolidation. Weekly readers have been supplied to students.









Health and Physical Education

This term in Health and Physical Education, students will explore topics and develop valuable skills that will help them stay safe, healthy, and active. From road safety to sun safety, everyone has the chance to discuss and practise ways to look after themselves and those around them. Through a range of group activities, students will explore social skills like cooperating, sharing, and working together. Different feelings people might have in various situations will also be explored. By learning to recognise emotions, students are better able to understand themselves and support their classmates. Students will explore actions that promote physical and emotional wellbeing. They will also discuss what to do if they ever need help or support. Towards the end of the term, students will embrace the great outdoors, participating in activities and games that connected them with their natural surroundings. It will be a wonderful term of learning, playing, and growing together in Health and Physical Education!



#### LLP

Students will explore forces and motion, specifically push and pull and how an objects properties such as shape, size and material alter the way it moves. Students will engage with scientific activities and investigations to relate findings to learn about space and our planets.



#### Numeracy

This term students are learning about data, and the data we collect every day. the data collection Using students will collect data in a variety of ways such as tallying, sorting counting to display the data in a variety of ways using the skill of reasoning to justify the collection method. Students will make picture graphs and column graphs using data thev have collected relating personally to their lives. Lastly, students will analyse each other's data and displays to answer their original asked questions reflecting on their data collection process.











#### Music

Students will study rhythm and pattern through body movements, dance, our outer world and through learning the basic finger positions and notes of the recorder. Students will build skills, confidence, self-expression, self-awareness and creativity to perform a Christmas song at the end of year Get Together event.

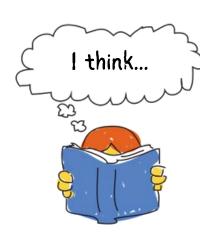


## Miss A 🙂 - Year 1/2

#### Term 4 Overview

The Year 1/2's are coming off an exciting end to Term 3, with Mini School attendees enjoying interactions and activities with Coober Pedy students, while the rest of the class got creative at home using the Scratch program and completing various STEM projects. We have started the final term of the year with a focused approach and a commitment to working hard to meet expectations.





# Literacy

In Literacy, students will trial the Writing Legends program to write an animal information report, further developing their skills in creating informative texts.



There will also be a continued focus on handwriting, reading comprehension, and spelling, including phonemes and morphology.

## Maths

For Maths this term, we will be investigating data through collecting, tallying, graphing, and analysing information from observations, questions, and measurements.

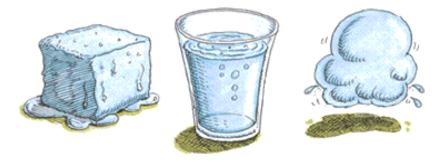
Multiplication and division will also be key areas of focus to strengthen number skills.





# Linked Learning

For our "Wonders of Water" unit in Linked Learning, we will cover the science of water (states of matter and interactions), design and technology challenges, movement through dance in The Arts, and the importance of water to communities and the environment in HASS.



# Health & Physical Education with Mr Kelly

Looking After Yourself and Getting Active!

During this term we will discover there are lots of ways you can look after your health and wellbeing and have fun with friends along the way. If you ever feel worried, unsafe or need help with something, it's important to know some strategies to use—like talking to a trusted adult, asking a friend for support, or using positive self-talk. You can make positive choices that promote health and safety for yourself and others. You may also learn to recognise when you or your friends might need help to stay safe and healthy and look for opportunities to support each other. You'll get to practise important movement skills, like running, jumping, throwing and catching. These are the building blocks for all sorts of fun activities and sports. Using your imagination, you can make up your own games with or without equipment. This is a great way to work together, have fun, and keep active. Enjoy this term's activities and stay safe, be active, and look after yourself and your friends!













#### Miss Kaur - Year 3/4

#### Term 4 Overview



Welcome back to Term 4! I hope everyone had a fantastic break and is feeling energised and ready to jump back in! This term is going to be packed with fun, learning, and lots of exciting activities as we wrap up the school year together. Here's a sneak peek at what we'll be exploring! This term, we will have three online lessons each for English, Maths and Linked Learning, and one lesson each for CPC and Japanese.

#### **Maths**

In Mathematics this term, we'll explore Statistics and Data. Students will become data investigators as they collect, record, and represent information using tables, pictographs, and column graphs. They'll learn about categorical and discrete numerical data, create surveys, and use digital tools to display their results. Through guided investigations, students will compare data, discuss patterns, and understand how variation and distribution help describe information.



#### **English**



In English this term, we'll be exploring the beautiful picture book Piano Fingers by Caroline Magerl, a lyrical story about a young girl discovering her own musical talent. Students will examine how the author and illustrator use words, images, and artistic techniques to create mood and meaning. Through close reading, discussion, and creative responses, students will practise using adjectives, verbs, and conjunctions to enhance their writing. They'll explore personification, metaphors, and imagery, connect personally with the text, and create own narrative inspired by the story.

We will also continue with our weekly spelling, comprehension, DORF, grammar and IXL tasks.



#### Linked Learning: Patterns of culture



This term, our Linked Learning unit celebrates the beauty of patterns across cultures. Students will explore how patterns tell stories and express identity through different traditions, histories, and art forms. From the intricate henna designs of India to the symbolic markings in Aboriginal dance and body art, we'll uncover the meanings and techniques behind these cultural expressions. Linking across History, The Arts, Technologies, and Science, students will investigate how materials, design, and pattern-making connect people and cultures around the world. Through creative projects and hands-on exploration, they'll design and share their own meaningful patterned artworks inspired by global traditions.

#### CPC:

This term in CPC students will learn to recognise different forms of abuse including cyberbullying. They will review the network of people they could talk to and learn some protective strategies.



#### **Arts: Music**



This term our Arts focus is on Music. We will explore the function and importance of beat in music, improvise, and experiment with beat and rhythmic patterns, and record and perform musical ideas using graphic notation.

#### Health and Physical Education (With Mr. Moyne)

In Health this term, students will be examining the need to balance time spent using electronic devices and playing outdoors. They will also learn about interacting safely, securely and respectfully online including how to create secure passwords and getting help when needed. Within physical education, students will be practicing and refining their skills in athletics in preparation for the upcoming SOTA sports day.

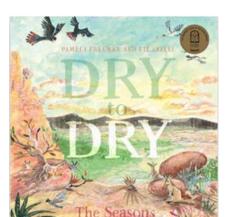




## Miss Morley - Year 5/6

#### Term 4 Overview

This year has been packed full of learning and excitement, but we are not quite finished yet – Welcome back to Term 4, our final term of 2025!



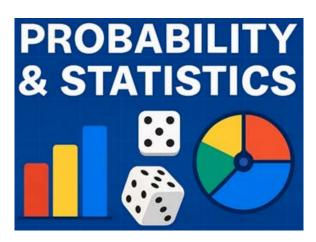
#### **English**

This term in English, we are examining a range of hybrid texts with the theme of Kakadu National Park.
Our class will explore how structural elements and language features from different genres can be combined to engage or convince an audience.

We will also continue to strengthen our understanding of word and sentence structures. This will include analysis and application of morphemes and sentence structures in lessons, follow-ups, and within our weekly DORF readings.

#### **Mathematics**

In Maths, we are learning about probability and chance, as well as statistics and data representations. During the first few weeks, students will estimate and calculate probability, conduct probability trials, and compare expected and observed results in chance experiments to learn how make informed predictions of the likelihood of events.



Our class will finish the term with data and statistics, with students interpreting, collecting, and comparing data sets from statistical investigations.

During our morning mathematics practice, we are continuing the "Automathic" program to enhance students' fluency with mathematical operations.



#### **Linked Learning**



For our final Linked Learning theme for this year, we are exploring natural disasters! We'll begin by exploring different types of natural disasters, developing our understanding of how they occur, their social and environmental impacts, and how people can prepare for or prevent damage during these adversities.

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In the second half of the term, we will move to music – exploring different styles of music through listening and response activities, and learn about the elements of music by creating digital compositions. Students will also continue to develop their recorder skills for our end of year performance aT Get Together.



#### **Child Protection Curriculum (CPC)**



This term we are continuing CPC on the topics of Recognising and Reporting Abuse, and Protective Strategies. Students will be learning to identify body parts, examine the difference between safe and unsafe touching, recognising abuse and manipulation, and protective strategies to remain safe.

#### Health and Physical Education (Mr Moyne)

In Health this term, Year 6 students will be exploring how they are feeling about 'change' - in particular the transition into secondary schooling. They will develop the skills necessary to deal with any concerns about change in an optimistic and encouraging way.

Year 5 students will be considering how to stay safe online. Students will learn about clickbait and keeping safe online as well as understanding gender stereotypes.



Within physical education, students will be practicing and refining their skills in athletics in preparation for the upcoming SOTA sports day.



#### Diwali

Diwali is the "Festival of Lights," a major holiday celebrated by Hindus, Jains, Sikhs, and some Buddhists that symbolizes the victory of light over darkness and good over evil.

Diwali is celebrated during the Hindu lunisolar months of Ashvin (according to the amanta tradition) and Kārtika – between around mid-September and mid-November.

This year Australia celebrated Diwali on October 21<sup>st</sup> and Angela treated us to a delicious and flavourful Indian lunch to celebrate Diwali.
