

MY NAME IS ALEXANDRA.

I prefer to be called Alex. I am 17 and I was diagnosed with chronic fatigue syndrome 4 years ago. I live with my parents and younger sister, in Adelaide. I love all things to do with my pet rabbits, gardening and video gaming.





I started Open Access mid-2014. Before then, I studied at home, as I was unable to attend a mainstream school due to my health. I struggled and still do with my studies due to a lack of energy, memory and concentration.

Besides that, other physical and mental symptoms can prevent me from completing work on time. When this happens, OAC makes work much more flexible. I can email my teachers with the circumstances, and allows me to negotiate when I hand in the work, within reason.

I try to attend all my scheduled classes, but if I am unable to, I am fortunate that Open Access allows me to catch up easily with lesson recordings, or a one on one lesson. I don't believe mainstream schools could provide that support. My health still fluctuates a lot, but I am very fortunate that the impact is minimised as I am able to work from the comfort of my own home.

AND TODAY...

I completed all of Year 11 in 2016, Heading into Year 12 in 2017. I am aiming to not only complete year 12 and my SACE, but achieve the highest grades that I can. I wish to continue my education regardless of my health, and would love to eventually study Psychology or Social Work at University.

I am honestly so thankful and appreciative that Open Access works for me, I couldn't have asked for a better opportunity to finish my education.



EDWARD JENKINS



MY NAME IS EDWARD...

I live in a small town in the Adelaide Hills called Kanmantoo. I live with my mum, younger brother, our Jack Russell and lots of chickens. My hobbies include playing piano, ukulele and the trumpet. I play hymns on the piano at church.





I also Like 2D and 3D animation, programming and using the computer. I like to play Minecraft and Mario games. Sometimes I make YouTube videos about Minecraft too. I like reading about History and how household objects work. I like to read the Bible. I have a few autistic tendencies; I was also born with multiple birth defects. I only have about 1/3 of vision in my left eye.

MY EXPERIENCE AT OAC...

I started OAC in the middle of 2014 because they were offering free Music lessons for year 9 and I always wanted to play trumpet. I started learning Spanish through OAC too. Things got tougher in year 10 because I couldn't cope with the workload. I dropped PLP at that time. My Spanish teacher was very supportive of me and helped me to improve – not just in Spanish but in other areas. I couldn't do music in year 11 in 2016 so I did literacy instead.

I got extra time for my last Maths test because of my health issues. That extra fifteen minutes helped me to pass maths. I also studied a Cert III in Screen and Media. In the second semester, I had to redo PLP along with Research Project. I fell behind but in a spurt of excellent weather I managed to get it all done and I finished my SACE.

I thank all my teachers and my mum for the help they gave me.

AND TODAY...

I am studying for my ATAR at OAC and I hope that they shall be able to help me and autistic children in the years to come. I intend to get a career in programming.



EMILY CAMERON



MY NAME IS EMILY.

I am 29 years old and I reside in the southern suburbs of Adelaide. I am a single mum to my two beautiful daughters who are 5 and 8 years old.

I enjoy being creative and find a lot of happiness and self-satisfaction in creating handmade projects.



After only completing year 10 back in 2002, I never strived to achieve much more, I felt that school was not for me and having little faith in my academic abilities, I just gave up.

In 2014 I became a single mum and knew that in order to provide my daughters with a better life I would need to go back to school. I wanted to complete my SACE and gain an ATAR but I lacked self-esteem and confidence.

After discovering Open Access College, I enrolled in English Communications and Modern History for the 2015 school year. The way the subjects were delivered online suited our lifestyle perfectly and meant that I did not need to create a lot of change to my daughters lives, which was important to me. The patience, understanding and support given by my teachers in that first year was incredibly meaningful for me and enabled a positive outcome that gave me the confidence and determination to succeed in my second year subjects.

I learnt a lot about myself throughout my time at OAC and have gained a new outlook on life that continually inspires me. The teachers truly are amazing and will go above and beyond to help you succeed.

AND TODAY...

After gaining a competitive ATAR, I was offered a place in the Bachelor of Midwifery at Flinders University. I am excited for the coming year and incredibly thankful that I made the decision to come to Open Access College.

MY EXPERIENCE AT OAC...

Throughout my time at OAC, I have really appreciated the flexible learning environment OAC provides. I am eighteen years old and live with my family of five in Gawler, South Australia.

I began my schooling with Open Access College a semester into year eleven and continued with them through my year twelve studies. I successfully graduated last year from OAC with great results in English Communications, Society and Culture, Modern History and Psychology.

Through studying with OAC, I developed an independence that would not have been replicated if I continued with the traditional education system. MY EXPERIENCE AT OAC...

I chose to change over from my then current school to Open Access once I came across some health issues which made face to face schooling really difficult.

I initially tried to complete Stage 1 with subjects I wasn't passionate about which led to me dropping out. However, when I decided to return to school I made the decision to do subjects I loved, such as Visual Arts. I completed Stage 1 between 2014-2015 and then took on a full course for Stage 2 in 2016.

Open Access really aided in the improvement of my health as it allowed me to work within a flexible timetable which gave me the opportunity to attend doctor's appointments and study when I was well enough to.

AND TODAY...

I have been accepted by the Australian National University to study fine arts, although I will be taking a gap year first before moving to Canberra. I plan to spend this year developing as an artist and hopefully volunteering at an art gallery. Eventually, I would love to work either in art administration or curatorship so that I can always be surrounded by art.

MY NAME IS JACK.

I'm an eighteen-year-old amateur artist based in Bali, Indonesia. After attending Australian International School for most of my primary and high school years, I switched to OAC to complete year 11 and 12. I live with my mother and have 2 older sisters. My interests include painting, drawing and photography.



Despite attending Australian International School since year 4 as I approached senior high school I started to find it incredibly hard to cope in a busy school environment. At first I was unsure about leaving AIS and starting at OAC but as time passed I started to enjoy the subjects and appreciated the wonderful help the teachers gave to me.

Learning from OAC has been a great experience as I've been able to work at home, which felt more comfortable, as well as make my own timetable and working hours, which gave me a good sense of independence.

When I started Open Access in year 11, I took Biology, Mathematical Application, Personal Learning Plan, Art, Digital Manipulation and Research Practice. In year 12, I did Art, Photography, Business and Enterprise and Psychology. I completed my Research Project in year 12.

AND TODAY...

OAC was fantastic; all the teachers were so supportive, caring and kind. I developed good communication and relationships with the students and teachers despite not physically seeing each other. OAC made it very possible for me to not only work efficiently but to have a sense of flexibility and do well in all subjects and not feel the pressure that I did at my previous school.

This year I'm taking a gap year to sort myself out as well as concentrate on my art and photography. I have attended a few photography workshops. I also intend to travel taking my camera wherever I go. I'm excited about what's ahead.

I also appreciated that the school was made available for "Come In" days, where we would complete practicals or exam workshops. This gave me the opportunity to meet and form friendships with other students.

AND TODAY...

I have now completed year 12, received my SACE and achieved an ATAR of 97.50. I have also just started work at a local sawmill, helping out in the office.
