## 2018 Year 8 School Immunisation Program

#### Dear Parent/Legal Guardian

Students in Year 8 are offered free vaccines under the National Immunisation Program to protect them from diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, and human papillomavirus (HPV).

A trained vaccination team will visit your child's school to offer these vaccinations.

Included with this letter is the Year 8 Consent Card. Please read the all the information provided on both sides of this page before completing the Consent Card. Keep this information for future reference.

It is important that you complete the Consent Card and return it to the school, even if you DO NOT consent for your child to be vaccinated.

Your child may have already received some of the vaccines offered in the School Immunisation Program if he/she has recently received catch up vaccines for missed childhood doses. Please make note of these details on the Consent Card in the space provided.

Consent may be withdrawn at any time prior to vaccination. Information provided on the Consent Card may be updated by contacting your school program provider.

Students will receive a vaccination record to take home. You are encouraged to keep this record. Vaccination records may be needed for future employment, study or travel.

If you have provided consent and your child is unwell or not at school on vaccination day, a letter will be sent to you with details on where to go to receive the missed vaccines.

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# Year 8 Parent/Legal Guardian Information Sheet

Diphtheria	Human papillomavirus (HPV)
<ul> <li>serious illness caused by a toxin produced by bacteria that acts on the airways or on damaged skin</li> <li>spread when an infected person coughs or sneezes or by direct contact with skin sores or objects/articles contaminated by an infected person</li> <li>1 in 6 people infected will die</li> <li>Complications include:         <ul> <li>severe breathing difficulties</li> <li>heart failure</li> <li>nerve paralysis/weakness</li> <li>death</li> </ul> </li> <li>Tetanus</li> <li>serious illness caused by a toxin produced by bacteria found in soil, dust</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>very common virus that affects females and males</li> <li>spread by intimate or sexual contact</li> <li>most people do not experience symptoms and do not know they have the infection or that they have spread it to someone else</li> <li>causes 90% of genital warts</li> <li>Complications include:</li> <li>cancers of the genital area – penis, anus, vulva, vagina, and cervix</li> <li>cancers of the throat and mouth in both males and females</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>and manure</li> <li>contracted through a cut or wound which becomes contaminated by the bacteria</li> </ul>	
<ul><li>not directly transmitted from person to person</li><li>most common in persons never vaccinated or those vaccinated many</li></ul>	HPV vaccine (Gardasil®9)
<ul><li>years ago</li><li>2 in 100 people infected will die</li></ul>	<ul> <li>is recommended as a 2 dose course in the School Immunisation Program</li> </ul>
Complications include:	• if your child is immunocompromised, speak to your doctor or immunisation provider
<ul><li>heart attack</li><li>blood clot in the lungs</li><li>death</li></ul>	<ul> <li>protects against nine HPV types most commonly related to genital cancers, throat and mouth cancers and genital warts</li> </ul>
Whooping cough (pertussis)	<ul> <li>provides a high level of protection if given to students before exposure to the HPV virus</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>highly infectious respiratory infection</li> <li>spread when an infected person coughs or sneezes</li> <li>about 90% of household contacts of an infected person will become infected if they are not vaccinated or were vaccinated many years ago</li> <li>Complications include:         <ul> <li>rib fractures</li> <li>seizures</li> <li>pneumonia</li> <li>brain damage from lack of oxygen</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	<ul> <li>will still be beneficial even if there has been exposure to the virus as it is unlikely that infection with all HPV types covered by the vaccine has occurred</li> <li>does not replace regular Pap smears for women as the vaccine protects against most, but not all types of HPV that cause cervical cancer. Diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis vaccine (Boostrix®)	
<ul> <li>is recommended as a single dose for all Year 8 students as an additional booster to doses already received in childhood</li> <li>is recommended for students who have previously received the ADT Booster (Adsorbed Diphtheria and Tetanus) vaccine for a tetanus prone wound to offer protection against whooping cough</li> <li>Common side effects of Boostrix® vaccine         <ul> <li>mild fever</li> <li>pain, redness and swelling at the injection site</li> <li>headache, nausea, generally feeling unwell, tiredness</li> <li>muscle aches and joint pain</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	Common side effects of Gardasil®9 vaccine <ul> <li>mild fever</li> <li>pain, swelling and redness at the injection site</li> <li>headache, dizziness</li> <li>nausea</li> <li>muscle aches</li> </ul>
